

2010 Winter Olympics – 100 Days and Counting

Kent Valley Ice Centre, Kent, WA – KVHA News for 11 November, 2009 – By the time you read this the 2010 Winter Olympics will be less than 100 days away. Consider this:

- **More than 15,000 players have tried to win World Championship gold since 1930.**
- **More than 9,000 players have tried to win the Stanley Cup since 1893.**
- **More than 4,000 players have tried to win Olympic gold since 1920.**
- **Only 22 players have won all three.**

In February, these 22 players will be honored for their unique accomplishment with the creation of **The Triple Gold Club, Hockey's most distinguished membership.**

The ceremony for the Triple Gold Club will take place on February 22, 2010, on the off-day of the men's tournament, one day before the start of the play-off round. The projected venue of the unique ceremony is the Molson Canadian Hockey House, which will be located just next to the Canada Hockey Place, the main venue of the Olympic ice hockey tournament.

Trivia Challenge: Before you click on the link below to see who the 22 players are, try and guess just two of them. Hint: One of the 22 is a close and dear friend of Hockey Director, Danny Lorenz.

Hockey's most distinguished membership consists of players from four nations. Sweden tops the list with nine members, Russia has six, Canada five and the Czech Republic two. The Triple Gold Club ceremony is a joint effort by the IIHF, the NHL and the NHLPA.

KVIC & KVHA Rink Notes:

KVIC Security Update - We asked, and you responded. Thanks to all those Kent Valley members who responded to our security e-mail with suggestions on how we could improve security at Kent Valley Ice Centre. So far, we were able to make sure all the lights were lit in the parking lot. Several ballasts were burnt out along with a couple burnt out light bulbs. We're also looking at moving some securable lockers closer to the locker rooms for use during practices and games.

Several members inquired as to why we weren't able to secure the locker rooms during practices and games to keep the bad guys out. We're exploring ways to accomplish that. However, fire code limits what we can do to secure the locker rooms. We can't do anything that would restrict someone's ability to exit the locker rooms should they get locked inside. Since locker rooms 3 & 4 share a common shower facility, the same as 5 & 6, we are limited in how we assign locker rooms to teams during games. We try to avoid two competing teams sharing the same shower facility, for obvious reasons. Consequently, two locker rooms (3 & 5 or 4 & 6) are always unlocked and accessible through the shower facility. We're confident we'll come up with a solution, but not sure what it's going to be. It may be that the best solution is to just not leave anything of value in a locker room at any time...

We're working on other security measures that were suggested by our members, as well as some of our own. We'll keep you posted. Thank you again for all the valuable feedback.

KVHA Mite Tornadoes Tame Tomahawks 10-1

Kent Valley Ice Centre, Kent, WA 7 November, 2009 – The KVHA Mite Tornadoes skated to a 10-1 victory over the visiting PSAHA Tomahawks, running their record to 5-0. The Tornadoes now lead the NPSHL Mite Division in wins (5), points (15), most goals scored (56), fewest goals allowed (12), and goals against average (2.40).

Skating without their leading scorer, Danny Smith, the Tornadoes demonstrated their great depth on offense, with 7 players appearing on the score sheet. They also demonstrated great energy and discipline, winning most free pucks and dominating both time of possession and shots (24-10).

Kemper Terry lead the way for the Tornadoes, netting a hat-trick, and continued his streak of being first on the scoring sheet, putting one by the Tomahawk keeper at the 1:20 mark of the first period to put the Tornadoes ahead 1-0. Jake Sordahl kept his 5 game scoring streak alive, scoring at the 4:33 mark (on a nifty assist from Trevor Mertel) to run the score to 2-1. The Tomahawks skated hard, however, and keeper Joe Bullock made some quality saves the rest of the 1st period to keep the Tornadoes from lighting the lamp again in the first.

Tomahawk forward Mac Donahue closed the gap to 2-1 at the 14:07 mark of the 1st; jamming home a rebound past the outstretched glove of Tornado goaltender Brett Jenkins. It would be the first and only Tomahawk goal of the day.

The Tornadoes exploded for 4 goals in both the 2nd and 3rd periods. Zach Johnston and Oliver Carlson both scored twice (with Ollie adding an assist, for a three point game) and Andrew Alonzo and Lexi Doner Jr. scored 13 seconds apart to set a new mark for quickest "back-to-back" goals this season.

The boys, despite some rough play in the third period, stayed out of the penalty box for their second straight game and earned their fifth sportsmanship point of the year.

Brett Jenkins tracked the puck well, and was solid in goal for the Tornadoes, stopping 9 of 10 shots. Brett has only given up 2 goals in the last 8 periods of play, stopping 29 shots during that stretch. His season save percentage is now 84%.

The Tornadoes travel this weekend to Bremerton to take on the KCHA Outlaws at the Bremerton Ice Arena.

PeeWee Hurricanes Sneak by Everett Grizzlies in NPSHL Thriller At Kent Valley Ice Centre

Kent Valley Ice Center, Kent, WA 7 November, 2009 – "With some help from my friends" seemed to be the PeeWee Hurricanes catchphrase during their Saturday morning home game against the Everett Grizzlies. With Danny Lorenz filling in as the only coach (all three regulars having previous commitments) the Hurricane team stuck together, played as a team and otherwise "had each others' backs" during what turned in to a very heated, defensive battle.

First period was very evenly matched with lots of end-to-end action. Immediately, Riley Agnew showed a continued intensity from the previous week. Kyle Pirttila and Jacob Ray were defensive specialists, brilliantly covering the crease, while all around them Grizzlies crashed the net hungry for loose pucks to bang home. Each saved potential goals by clearing pucks sitting tauntingly on the goal line as goalie Ben Cary recovered from initial saves. During one particularly gutsy defensive move, Ray expertly laid down to save a 2-on-1 break!

Normally offensive Dennis Zaks showed he could also play enlightened defense and full end-to-end hockey. First year Caelin Byrnes had a memorable defensive effort on the nearside boards, shielding the offensive man into them, having the wherewithal to reach around and get a few good whacks in on his stick trying to lift it. First year Ryan Atkins was able to intercept a Grizzly pass at their blue line to help his offense start a push, awaking the Hurricane offense, notably Kyle Pirttila!

After already showing his prowess in D, Pirttila "awakened" offensively to become a serious thorn in Everett's side, scoring his first of the season, unassisted, after gaining the puck in the Hurricane zone to break up the nearside boards, flying past two defenders, to slap a shot from the circle that appeared to slither through the 5-hole. Not more than two minutes later, Pirttila, the man of the hour, lit the lamp for his **SECOND UNASSISTED GOAL** of the game (and season), after blocking a Grizzly shot at the Hurricane blueline to grab the puck as it dropped to his skates, split the two unsuspecting Grizzly defenders down the middle to wrist a shot on goal that again beat the Grizzly goalie! Hurricanes up 2-0 and the cowbells rang in a joyous cacophony!!!

Second period was kept scoreless by solid Hurricane defense, which sometimes included usually offensive players, showing just how well-rounded this Hurricane team is becoming. Emily Atkins showed soccer prowess with her feet all through the second, stopping or intercepting and playing on the puck countless times. But she too had goalie Cary's back when, after being beat in the initial play at the redline, Atkins hustled back to still end up with the puck and deny yet another potential Grizzly goal when she cleared the puck from the crease when her goalie was down after stopping the initial shot on goal. Brianna Baker, the other Hurricane "Chick With A Stick", had a wonderful play to stop a 2-on-1 break, only to be dropped to the ice immediately afterwards by a wing coming over cross ice!

The Hurricane offensive, though, was still alive. Caelin Byrnes tried his hand at play-making, at one point calmly holding the puck as the offense set up, only to have his pass intercepted by a foresighted Grizzly. First year Keene Zurn showed excellent end-to-end effort both defensively and offensively, really chasing after pucks and, with Ryan Atkins, putting pressure on an increasingly frustrated Grizzly offense.

Blaine Reich exemplified awesome effort to chase down and play a puck that looked to be called as iced...even the Grizzly defense let it slide right by without a second thought. But Reich's intensity allowed him to collar the puck, catching the Grizzlies completely off-guard

where they had to scramble to the net to block the ensuing shot Reich managed to get off! A perfect example why players should ALWAYS PLAY TO A WHISTLE!

With the third the Hurricanes suddenly, and mysteriously, went as flat as day old champagne, standing around, not moving their feet, seemingly content to hold on to their 2-0 lead. A defensive highlight, though, was provided by Camden Mallery who knocked a poor Grizzly into the Ice Ages with a MONSTER, YouTube-worthy, hit. Not all offense, however, was lost. Ryan Atkins stepped up to split the defense, alone, at their blue line and get off his first shot on goal of the season. There was a juicy rebound to be had, but he just couldn't get net front quick enough to pounce on it. Riley Agnew just missed getting his stick on a dead-on cross crease pass from Dennis Zaks. Blaine Reich had a solid shot on goal which started with him weaving his way down ice alone through Grizzlies, like he was pole bending and did it every day!

Third period suddenly drew penalties as Grizzly frustrations began to show. All was for naught as they lit the lamp on a breakaway by their captain to draw within one of the all important tying goal, and providing a nail-biting, agonizing, last seven minutes for Hurricane fans.

Everett pulled their goalie for the extra attacker with 2 Hurricanes in the box to begin an offensive charge that left the Hurricanes unable to clear the puck which, in turn, let the onslaught continue. Thankfully for the Hurricanes the extra man advantage was soon nullified when a Grizzly was sent to the box with a hooking call.

Hurricane parents and supporters anxiously counted down the final two minutes of play as the Hurricanes literally huddled around goalie Ben Cary as the Grizzlies bore down, peppering the goal with shots that were weakly held off. Cary did everything but stand on his head as his defense rallied to his side and fought to control and clear the puck to close out the victory...by far the most nerve-wracking two minutes of Hurricane hockey played yet!!!
